## **Snead State Community College Security Authority and Mission Statement**

The Office of Security is a non-law enforcement office, and does not possess typical law enforcement arrest powers. However, Boaz Police Department (256- 593-6812) maintains law enforcement jurisdiction of the SSCC Boaz main campus. The Office of Security at SSCC works as an administrative office and in support of College and law enforcement efforts as needed. The SSCC main campus also utilizes non-sworn contract security support through Dynamic Security Services (256- 277-8401). The security contractor normally provides evening, weekend, and special event coverage as needed. The Arab Instructional Site relies on Arab Police Department (256- 586-8124) for any calls of service, and the Aviation College at Snead State relies on Albertville Police Department (256- 878-1212) for calls of service. The Office of Security does respond to each campus and location as needed and in support of campus and program needs.

The SSCC Office of Security (256- 264-5060 c (256- 840-4167) o is physically located at the SSCC main campus in Boaz, Alabama and exists to help support the various functions of Snead State Community College. To this end, the Office of Security seeks to help maintain successful parking and commuting systems, and to be of general service to the College and community. The Office of Security desires to fulfill all administrative and support obligations in a professional and pleasant manner at all locations. The College feels strongly that public relations is a vital aspect of service. The SSCC Office of Security does become engaged in administrative disciplinary issues as needed, and

can often respond to various incidents prior to police department arrival on the main campus.

**Snead State’s Relationship with Federal, State, and Local Law Enforcement Agencies**

The Snead State Office of Security works routinely with federal, state, and local law enforcement as needed. The Office of Security conducts training for the local police department regarding Clery Act requirements, and also involves all entities and agencies needed in engaging the College’s Emergency Response Plan. The Director of Security at Snead State provides training as requested for the Northeast Alabama Law Enforcement Academy in the areas of Legal Issues and Corrections. This training is provided to all new local, county, state, and additional law enforcement cadets attending the academy at the Anniston, Alabama location. The SSCC Office of Security also has a very good working relationship with FBI, OPM, and EMA personnel.

**Reporting Criminal Actions or Other Emergencies**

We encourage all victims to promptly and accurately report all crimes, incidents, or emergencies to the local police department, and to the SSCC Office of Security.

Please note that a Campus Security Authority (CSA) is not responsible for determining whether a crime took place. A “CSA” should not try to apprehend a perpetrator or conduct any component of an investigation. It is also not the responsibility of a CSA to influence a victim to contact law enforcement if the victim chooses not to do so.

### Reporting Emergencies on Campus

It is the policy of Snead State Community College that any criminal act or threat of violence, injury, destruction of college or personal property, traffic accident, or any other situation that occurs on college property and that may constitute an emergency, danger to health, safety, or property of any person, or a threat to public order be reported immediately to respective local law enforcement and to the Office of Security. An emergency is any event that is disruptive to the normal affairs of the college. Members of the campus community should be alert to situations and make immediate reports by

- a) Stating your name, b) State type of emergency c) State location of emergency
- d) Remain in the area until assistance arrives if able

### Reporting of Emergencies- On Campus

- A. **Medical Emergencies:** In case of major injury or serious illness:

- B. **Fire/Explosion/Hazardous Material Spill:** In case of fire, explosion, or hazardous material spill: **A.** Activate fire alarm or otherwise notify occupants to vacate the building, **B.** Call 911 and **C.** Call Campus Security 256-264-5060 © 256-840-4167 (o), **D.** Call Maintenance 256-840-4144.

- C. **Criminal Acts:** In case of criminal acts including but not limited to murder, rape, robbery, burglary, aggravated assault, or motor vehicle theft, contact the local law enforcement agency specific to your campus by calling 911; or at the numbers listed for the respective police department servicing your campus area. Also, contact **SSCC Security** by calling 256-264-5060 ©, 256-840-4167. **Dynamic Security contractor** also provides coverage of the main campus in Boaz during evenings and weekends. Their contact number is 256-277-8401.

## **Emergency Procedures**

1. **Criminal Acts-** Boaz Police Department has primary jurisdiction for response, and investigation of all criminal actions on main campus property. Arab Police Department has primary jurisdiction for the same at Arab Site, and Albertville Police Department has primary jurisdiction for the same at the Aviation College. To report a crime, please call your specific police department or call 911 in any emergency. Also, please contact the SSCC Office of Security and notify them as well.
2. **Medical Emergencies-** Call 911 to summon emergency assistance, and also contact the SSCC Office of Security.
3. **Fire-** Call 911 to report a fire. Also, contact SSCC Security. Fire extinguishers are located in common areas on all floors of campus buildings.
4. **Emergency Procedures- Building Evacuation-** In the event it becomes necessary to evacuate a building, all occupants are expected to vacate the facility as directed, and in accordance with the SSCC Emergency Response and Operations Plan (SSCC EROP). All employees and adjuncts should be familiar with this plan in order to effectively direct students and visitors. **The plan is located on the “intranet” under Emergency Response Plan. Employees are strongly encouraged to review the plan at least semi-annually.** During fire events, do not use elevators. In the event of a building evacuation, a rally point is identified for each building in the SSCC EROP, and additional information may also be broadcast in a Snead State Alert.
5. **Emergency Procedures- Tornado-** The Schoolcast Alert System (Snead State Alert) provides the option for all enrollees to receive weather alerts consistent

with any warnings broadcast by the National Weather Service. In the event of a tornado threat affecting campus, an emergency notification will be sent. The campus community should take shelter in the lowest floor of their building in the safe area designated for their building in the **SSCC Emergency Response and Operations Plan**. Employees should consult the EROP if they have questions about their specific building or area. Building Managers and Campus Security Authorities are responsible for ensuring employees and adjuncts in their areas know this and other information located in the SSCC EROP. When the tornado threat is over, an all-clear will be given and normal activities may resume.

### **Reporting “Off-Campus” Crimes and Other Emergencies**

Victims and witnesses to criminal activity occurring off campus should contact the appropriate agency for their jurisdiction, by calling the specific local police department, or by calling 911.

### **Emergency Operation Training and Drills**

Snead State Community College has a documented process for significant emergencies or dangerous situations involving threats to the health and safety of students, employees, and visitors. The processes are detailed in the **SSCC Emergency Response and Operations Plan** located on the intranet. The EROP includes information about the college’s operating status parameters, incident priorities, shelter, and evacuation guidelines, along with much additional information. All employees are strongly encouraged to regularly familiarize themselves with the EROP.

The College conducts emergency response exercises and training each year, which may also include tabletop exercises, field exercises, and tests of emergency notification systems. These efforts are designed to assess and evaluate emergency plans, and capabilities of the institution. When a serious incident that causes a threat to campus occurs, the local police department will respond, along with SSCC Security and/or Security contractors; depending on the timing of the emergency. Additional resources from a variety of local, state, and federal agencies will be requested as needed.

### **Snead State Security Response to Crime**

Victims of crime are encouraged to report offenses to the local police department. However, SSCC Security is many times in a position to effectively respond and assist prior to police department arrival. Security can often assist in keeping others safe, and in securing an area if needed, along with providing additional supportive measures to the local police department. SSCC Security is always willing to assist victims with reporting to law enforcement.

Victims have the option of initiating a disciplinary process if the alleged offender is a student. Disciplinary actions could be filed in place of or in addition to any criminal actions. Code of conduct violations may be submitted to the following:

### **Code of Conduct Process for Students**

Upon receipt of a code of conduct complaint, the VP for Student Services may assign the case to an investigator to gather additional facts. If there is probable cause to determine that a violation of the SSCC Code of Conduct has occurred, the report will proceed to a hearing if the case cannot be settled through an informal resolution process. After a decision is made concerning the guilt of the accused, the decision may be appealed to the President for review. The President’s decision is final.

### **Complaint Process for Employees**

In circumstances in which the offender is a school employee, victims may file a complaint with Human Resources in place of or in addition to seeking formal charges. These complaints may be submitted to: Amanda Gunnels, Human Resources, (256) 840-4113.

The victim of a crime who does not want to pursue action within the college system or the criminal justice system may still consider making a report to a Campus Security Authority. A student or employee may notify any Campus Security Authority about a crime and they can file a report without revealing their identity. The College cannot guarantee confidentiality; but in all cases the utmost privacy and professionalism is extended. The purpose of a confidential report is to comply with the reporting individual’s intent to keep the matter confidential as much as possible, while taking steps to ensure their safety and the safety of campus and others. Further options will be discussed with the reporting party. With such information, the College can keep an accurate record of the number of incidents involving student’s, employees, and visitors; determine where there may be a pattern of criminal activity, and/or alert the campus to potential danger if deemed necessary. Reports filed in this manner are counted and disclosed in the annual crime statistics survey for the College.



## **Crisis and Other Urgent Communications**

“Clery Act” timely warning notices are specifically related to compliance with the federally mandated act, which requires colleges and universities to notify students and employees whenever there is a threat that a serious crime has been reported and/or may be repeated, in order for the campus community to take steps to protect themselves and others. The Clery Act defines specific crimes that require a timely warning notice be issued when crimes are reported to Security, a CSA, or the police, and the reported crime is believed to have occurred on campus, in or on non-campus buildings or property, or on public property immediately contiguous to the campus.

### **Timing, Content, and Decision Criteria for Issuing an Alert:**

The Clery Act does not define what is “timely.” However, the warning should be issued as soon as pertinent information is available, because the intent of the Clery warning is to alert campus to certain specifically defined criminal events and potential continuing threats if they are believed to exist. Clery Act regulations do not specify what exactly should be included in a timely warning. However, the warning should include information that would promote actions to encourage security awareness. The issuance of an alert should be decided on a case-by-case basis in light of all known facts surrounding a crime. These include the nature of the crime, any continuing danger, and any potential risk of compromising law enforcement or security efforts to manage, protect, respond, or apprehend an offender. Generally, the alert should specify the type of crime reported, time and location where the crime occurred, and specific advice regarding steps to avoid becoming a victim of a similar crime. The decision to issue an alert is normally made by the Director of Security, and may involve consultation with the President and/or law enforcement. Both the Office of Security and members of the College IT Department, among others, are equipped and trained to issue emergency alerts.

A crime alert may be disseminated campus-wide using a variety of methods that include Snead State alert (schoolcast), official SSCC e-mail, web page, and/or social media via SSCC facebook and twitter pages. Sometimes an alert may be isolated to certain areas or groups of people based on the nature of the crime/situation.

### **Emergency Notifications**

If a potentially life-threatening emergency exists that necessitates an urgent notification to the campus community, such as a tornado threat or active shooter, the schoolcast emergency alert system will be utilized. This message will be sent via cell phone texts, e-mail, and land-line phone if you have registered all of these contacts in the schoolcast system. It is up to each student and employee to register in order to receive any such alert. [www.myschoolcast.com](http://www.myschoolcast.com) When registering, please be sure to include your cell phone, as this is the best way to ensure you receive any such alert quickly. **All instructors should ensure at least one or two students in a class have signed up for these alerts and have access to a phone when in class.** It is possible for employees to receive alerts that students would not see and vice versa. However, in a major

emergency/threat, all groups would receive an alert. If you have any issues registering as a student or employee in the schoolcast system, please contact the IT Department or the Office of Security.

### **Security of Personal Property**

The College is not responsible for personal property, nor can the College assume responsibility for the protection of vehicles and their contents. SSCC Security recommends students and employees make the effort to limit others access to personal property by concealing books and computers when prudent, and securing supplies and other valuables appropriately. Items such as cell phones, purses, wallets, shopping bags, book bags, and related items should not be left unattended or unattended in an accessible vehicle in plain view.

### **Security of and Access to Campus Facilities**

Snead State Community College is committed to providing a safe and secure environment for all members of the campus community. Campus facilities with scheduled classes/events are unlocked by the maintenance department each morning and secured in the evenings after classes/events have been completed. Normal accessible hours during the semester are:

Boaz Campus: 7:00 a.m.- 10:00 p.m. Monday- Thursday (depending on bldg. and class schedules for specific buildings)  
Weekends: as needed for events

Arab Site: (varies by semester)

SSCC Aviation: 4:00 p.m. -10:30 p.m. Monday- Thursday and 4:00 p.m.-8:00 p.m. (Friday). Schedule may vary by semester.

Normal hours of campus and facility access can and will fluctuate due to classes and events as necessary during the semester. Buildings which have completed their daily activities and classes will be secured shortly afterwards. Keep in mind these hours did fluctuate and were heavily modified during most of 2020 due to the Covid-19 Pandemic, as campuses converted to online/virtual delivery. Effectively, campuses have migrated back to more normal operations.

As a rule, no one should be in college buildings after normal operational hours. Faculty and staff who may have access to campus facilities after hours by authorized, issued key should have permission from an administrator and/or security to be on campus occupying an office or building after hours. Once buildings are secured in the evening, employees should not return to campus and access a building without making proper notifications. This is to ensure campus buildings/properties are secured efficiently.

## **Safety and Security Programs**

Safety and security topics of interest and programs are provided by the Office of Security when requested, and at other times during Orientations and employee meetings and trainings. Types of classes include: Dealing with Disruptive Persons, Bystander Intervention, Crime Reduction Tips, and other classes as requested or deemed appropriate. Other related subject matter is also available online via the SSCC intranet.

## **Campus Crime Statistics Disclosure**

Snead State Community College is required under section 668.46 (b) of the Campus Security Act to publish and distribute an Annual Security Report. The Campus Crime and Security Survey is also required and may be located at <http://ope.ed.gov/security>. The offenses for which the Campus Security Act requires statistical reporting are defined in accordance with the FBI Uniform Crime Reporting System, as modified by the Hate Crimes Statistics Act. Victims of crimes may report confidentially for inclusion in the annual disclosure of crime statistics.

## **Monitoring Campus, Non-Campus, and Public Property**

The Snead State Office of Security maintains a log of all reports of crimes that occur on Snead State Community College property. Each year prior to the crime survey and Annual Security report being completed; e-mails, telephone contacts, and statistical request letters are completed by the Office of Security to various law enforcement jurisdictions in order to determine if any Clery Act reportable crimes associated with any SSCC campus or property took place. The Office of Security includes any such applicable reported crimes by these jurisdictions in its report and crime log.

## **Daily Crime Log**

SSCC maintains a daily crime and activity log that records the date an incident was reported, type of incident, general location of the incident, and disposition of the complaint (if known). Criminal incidents are normally posted the same day, but can be posted within two days of the reported incident. These records are available for public inspection at any SSCC campus location during business hours. ## **Definitions of crimes which are reportable as required by the Clery Act are:**

**Domestic Violence:** Defined under federal law as any felony or misdemeanor crime of violence committed by:

- Current or former spouse or intimate partner of the victim or
- Person with whom the victim shares a child or

- A person who has or is cohabitating with the victim as a spouse or intimate partner, or
- A person similarly situated to a spouse of the victim under the domestic or family violence laws of the jurisdiction in which the crime of violence occurred, or
- By ANY person against an adult or youth victim who is protected by domestic or family violence laws of the jurisdiction in which the crime of violence occurred.

**Dating Violence:** Violence committed by a person who is or has been in a social relationship of a romantic or intimate nature with the victim. The existence of such a relationship shall be determined based on the complainant's statement, length of relationship, type of relationship, and the frequency of interaction between the persons involved. For the purpose of this definition, dating violence includes but is not limited to; sexual or physical abuse, or the threat of such abuse. Dating violence does not include acts covered under the definition of domestic violence. For the purpose of complying with the requirements of this section, any incident meeting this definition is considered a reportable crime under Clery Act guidelines.

**Sexual Assault:** Any form of actual or attempted sexual activity perpetrated upon a person without that person's consent; including sexual behavior coerced through physical or verbal threats, force, or other manipulation. This includes any sexual behavior when one person cannot give consent due to incapacitation.

**Rape:** Penetration, no matter how slight, of the vagina or anus with any body part or object; or, oral penetration by a sex organ of another person without the consent of the victim. This definition includes any gender of victim or perpetrator.

**Fondling:** The touching of private body parts of another person for the purpose of sexual gratification without the consent of the victim, including instances where the victim is incapable of giving consent due to age of the victim, or due to temporary or permanent mental or physical incapacity.

**Incest:** Sexual intercourse between persons who are related to each other within such degree that marriage would be prohibited by law.

**Consent:** Knowing, voluntary, and clear permission by word or action, to engage in mutually agreed upon sexual activity. Each party has the responsibility to make certain that the other has consented before engaging in the activity. The request of consent must be specific to each act and should be obtained with each new level of physical and/or sexual contact or conduct in any given interaction regardless of who initiates the action. For consent to be valid, there must be (at the time of the act) actual words or conduct indicating freely given agreement to have sexual intercourse or sexual contact. A person is incapable of consent if they are unable to understand what is taking place or is in any way disoriented, helpless, asleep, or unconscious (including unconsciousness due to alcohol or other drug effects). A person who engages in sexual activity when they know or should know that the other person is incapacitated is engaging in non-consensual

conduct. Consent is the act of willingly and verbally agreeing to engage in specific sexual contact or conduct. Obtaining consent is an ongoing process in any sexual interaction.

**Stalking:** Stalking is defined as intentionally and repeatedly harassing or following a person and intentionally or unintentionally placing a person in fear of physical harm to one's person or property, or physical harm to another's person or property. A person engages in stalking if, without lawful authority and under circumstances not amounting to a felony attempt of another crime, he or she:

- Intentionally and repeatedly harasses or follows another person, and,
- The person being harassed or followed is placed in fear that the stalker intends to injure the person, another person, or property of the person or another person. The feeling and perception of fear must be one that a reasonable person in the same situation would experience under the same circumstances; and,
- The stalker either intends to frighten, intimidate, or harass the person; or knows or reasonably should know that the person is afraid, intimidated, or harassed even if the stalker did not intend to place the person in fear, intimidate, or harass them.
- If he/she attempts to contact or follow the person after being given notice that the person does not want to be contacted or followed. That constitutes "prima facia" evidence that the stalker intends to intimidate or harass the person. "Contact" includes, in addition to any other form of contact or communication, the sending of electronic communications to the person.

## **Confidentiality**

SSCC encourages anyone who is the victim or witness to any crime to promptly report the incident to the local police department of jurisdiction and to the SSCC Office of Security. Anonymous reports to Campus Security Authorities may be filed for statistical reporting purposes. A student's privacy concerns are weighed against the need to respond to certain incidents and crimes. To the greatest extent possible, reports will remain private, other than required non-identifying documentation (crime log). In compelling scenarios, SSCC reserves the right to take reasonable action in response to a crime report, and information may be shared with appropriate departments and agencies when it pertains to investigative needs and safety concerns of the campus community. All reports submitted on a confidential or anonymous basis are evaluated for the purposes of potentially issuing a campus-wide "timely warning" as well as inclusion in the annual crime statistics.

## **Arrest Statistics Relating to Alcohol, Drugs, and Weapons**

In compliance with the Campus Security Act, institutions must also report the numbers of arrests for liquor law violations, drug abuse violations, and weapons possession.

Definitions of crimes for which arrests must be reported are:

- **Liquor Law Violations:** Violations of laws or ordinances prohibiting the manufacture, sale, purchase, transportation, possession, or use of alcoholic beverages (with the exception of "driving under the influence" or "drunkenness").

- **Drug Abuse Violations:** Violations of laws prohibiting the production, distribution, and/or use of certain controlled substances; and the equipment or devices utilized in their preparation or use.
- **Weapons Possession:** Violations of laws or ordinances prohibiting the manufacture, sale, purchase, transportation, possession, concealment; or use of firearms, cutting instruments, explosives, incendiary devices, or other deadly weapons.

**Hate Crimes**

Includes all the crimes listed under reportable crimes that manifest evidence that the victim was chosen based upon one of the categories of bias listed below, plus the following crimes (if such evidence is indicated):

**Larceny/Theft-** Includes pocket picking, purse snatching, shoplifting, theft from building, theft from vehicle, theft of motor vehicle parts or accessories, and all other larceny.

**Simple Assault-** An unlawful physical attack by one person upon another where neither the offender displays a weapon, nor the victim suffers obvious, severe, or aggravated bodily injury involving broken bones, loss of teeth, internal injury, laceration, or loss of consciousness.

**Intimidation-** To unlawfully place another person in reasonable fear of bodily harm through the use of threatening words and/or other conduct but without displaying a weapon or subjecting the victim to actual physical attack.

**Destruction/Damage/Vandalism to Property (except Arson)-** To willfully or maliciously destroy, damage, deface, or otherwise injure real or personal property without the consent of the owner or the person having custody or control of the property.

**The categories of “bias” included in Hate Crime reporting include:** race, gender, gender identity, religion, sexual orientation, ethnic/national origin, and disability.

**Notification to Victims of Crime of Violence**

Snead State Community College will, upon written request, disclose to the alleged victim of a crime of violence or non-forcible sex offense, the report of results of any administrative disciplinary procedure conducted by the college against a student who is the alleged perpetrator of such a crime or offense. If the alleged victim is deceased as the result of the crime or offense, the next of kin of such victim shall be treated as the alleged victim for the purpose of this paragraph. According to Section 16 of title 18 of the United States Code, the term “crime of violence” means:

- A. An offense that has as an element the use, attempted use, or threatened use of physical force against the person or property of another, or
- B. Any other offense that is a felony and that, by its nature, involves a substantial risk that physical force against the person or property of another may be used in the course of committing the offense.
- C. The results of an administrative disciplinary proceeding means only the institutions final determination with respect to the commission of the alleged offense and any sanctions imposed against the accused.

**Sex Offender Registry**

The Federal Campus Sex Crimes Prevention Act, enacted on October 28, 2000, and the Adam Walsh Child Protection and Safety Act of 2006 requires institutions of higher education to issue a statement advising the campus community where law enforcement agency information provided by a state concerning registered sex offenders may be obtained. It also requires sex offenders already required to register in a state to provide notice, as required under law, to each institution of higher education in that state at which the person is employed, carries on a vocation, or is a student. ## **Sexual Offenses**

Snead State Community College places a high priority on the safety of all students, employees, and visitors. Any type of sexual misconduct is strictly forbidden at all Snead State campus locations, sites, or properties. Both college administrative disciplinary procedures and also formal criminal charges may be applied.

1. **Educational Programs-** Programs aimed at raising awareness and helping to keep the campus community free of such offenses are administered through Campus Save requirements and are included in student and employee orientation materials, and also online (for employees/intranet). Such topics are addressed through athletics, security, student services, activities, and human resources. Education fliers and posters are also placed in prominent areas throughout campus. “Parson Days” is also utilized as an opportunity to orient incoming students to these topics.
2. **Sanctions-** Upon determination that a student or employee has committed rape, acquaintance rape, or other sexual offense; sanctions such as criminal charges, administrative charges, probation, suspension, expulsion, termination, and ban from college property are all available repercussions.

## **Sexual Assault Elimination Act**

Enacted in March of 2013, the Campus Save Act is the most recent and far-reaching in a long line of laws and policies that protect students from sexual violence and harassment. The act requires students and college employees to be trained in appropriate response to sexual violence and harassment.

## **SSCC Policy**

Snead State places a high priority on the safety of all students, employees, and visitors. Any type of harassment, abuse, physical violence, or intimidation is forbidden. Both administrative and formal criminal charges may be invoked by such offenses.

## **Student Bill of Rights**

1. Complainants have the right to assistance by all faculty and staff in reporting allegations of harassment, abuse, physical violence, sexual violence, or intimidation.
2. Complainants have the right in choosing the manner in which the complaint is filed, and options include: reporting to law enforcement, requesting an administrative inquiry, choosing not to report, reporting anonymously, or choosing to report to law enforcement and also reporting to the school.

3. Complainants have the right to confidentiality when reporting allegations of harassment, abuse, physical violence, sexual abuse, or intimidation.
4. Complainants have the right to a thorough and professional investigation that protects the rights of both the accuser and the accused.
5. Complainants have the right to know that criminal sanctions include probation, fines, imprisonment, or counseling.
6. Complainants have the right to know that school disciplinary sanctions include probation, suspension, expulsion, counseling, termination of employment, and ban from college property.
7. Complainants have the right to assistance in obtaining orders of protection, no contact orders, and restraining orders concerning offenses that occur on campus when requested.
8. Complainants have the right to know that there will not be a monetary charge for filing school disciplinary complaints.
9. Complainants have the right to a prompt, fair, and impartial investigation, conducted by properly trained individuals who receive annual training.
10. Both the accuser and accused have the right to simultaneous written notification of the outcome at each stage in the process.
11. Both the accuser and accused have the right to appeal code of conduct decisions.
12. Complainants have the right to assistance with reasonable accommodations regarding academic and work scheduling when requested and available; whether or not the offense was reported to law enforcement. The location of the offense does not affect this right.
13. Snead State Community College will not allow any form of retaliation against a complainant for making an allegation of harassment, abuse, physical violence, or intimidation.

### **Instructions for Sexual Assault Victims**

In the event you or another person is the victim of sexual assault, it is important to remember details as best you can, and notify the proper authority. The single most important thing a victim of sexual assault can do is to tell someone; the police, friend, medical professional, security, etc. Sexual assault, whether by a stranger or someone you know, is a violation of your body, your trust, and your right to choose. The following are recommended procedures to follow in cases of sexual assault:

1. Do not shower, wash, or change your clothes
2. Do not brush your teeth
3. Preserve any evidence such as clothing, used condoms, towels, tissue, or other items which may be useful for investigation purposes.
4. If the incident occurs on campus, you are encouraged strongly to contact the local police department (911), as well as the Office of Security at 256-264-5060. If the incident occurs off campus, you are also strongly encouraged to call 911 and report the incident.
5. Seek medical attention immediately. Local emergency services can be obtained by calling 911.
6. Seek counseling to assist with mental and emotional trauma. Information related to counseling services is available through various agencies and can be obtained through both Student Services and the Office of Security.

### **How to be an Active Bystander**

Bystanders play a critical role in the prevention of sexual and relationship violence. A bystander is defined as an “individual who observes or witnesses” conditions that perpetuate violence. They are not directly involved in most cases, but do have the choice to intervene on some level, speak up, or create some other action to prevent the behavior from escalating. Snead State Community College seeks to promote a culture of community accountability where bystanders are actively engaged in the prevention of violence. You may not always know what to do in the event you witness behavior which could potentially lead to further harm. However, the link below provides useful information to help bystanders make more informed decisions:

- If you or someone else is in immediate danger, dial 911. This could be when a person is yelling or being physically abusive towards another person and it is not safe for you to intervene.
- Watch out for your friends and fellow students and employees. If you see someone who looks like they could be in trouble or need help, ask if they are ok.

- Confront or interrupt events in any way you can if you observe someone who attempts to seclude, hit on, tries to make out with, or attempts sexual interaction with a person who is incapacitated.
- Speak up when someone discusses plans to take advantage of another person.
- Believe someone who discloses a sexual assault, abusive behavior, or experiences stalking.

## **Risk Reduction**

With no intent to “victim blame,” recognize that only abusers are responsible for abuse. The following are some strategies to reduce one’s risk of sexual assault and harassment via the Rape, Abuse, and Incest National Network. [www.rainn.org](http://www.rainn.org)

## **Protection from Abuse Orders**

Snead State Community College recognizes protection from abuse orders/restraining orders. Any member of the campus community that obtains such order should notify the Office of Security, and it is requested you provide a copy of the order to be kept on file. The Office of Security can assist you as needed with developing an action plan. The purpose of such planning is to reduce risk and potential harm to the complainant or others while on campus or in traveling to and from campus. ## **Missing Student Notification**

Snead State Community College has adopted a formal “Missing Student Notification” protocol which will be enacted in the event a main campus housing student is determined or reported to be missing. In the event a housing resident has been missing for 24 hours, individuals should report this information to the Boaz Police Department 256-593-6812, AND/OR or to Director of Security Gore in the Office of Security 256-840-4167 (office), 256-264-5060 (cell) at Snead State Community College ([pgore@snead.edu](mailto:pgore@snead.edu)). This information may also be reported to the Director of Housing, Jason Cannon, by calling 256-840-4150. The Arab Instructional Site and Aviation College at Snead State does not provide student housing.

Each student in Elder Hall (SSCC main campus student housing facility) has the option to register a confidential contact person to be notified in the event that a student is determined to be missing. Only authorized campus officials and law enforcement officers in the furtherance of their duties may have access to this information. All students, even if they have not registered a contact person, should be aware that local law enforcement will be notified in the event of a missing student report. Students less than 18 years of age and not emancipated should be aware that their parent/guardian will be notified.

In the event of a missing student notification/report, the report will be referred immediately to the Boaz Police Department by the Office of Security. In the event a

student is observed to be missing for 24 hours, the missing student policy will be placed into effect at that time. However, in the event of a missing housing student where there is additional information which indicates a need for immediate implementation, notification will take place as soon as possible, even if the 24 hour standard has not been met. Normally, the Director of Security will make this decision based on available information, and will consult with local law enforcement.

**Drug and Alcohol-Free Campus**

As required by Section 22 of the Drug Free Schools and Communities Act of 1989 (Public Law 101-226) and in recognition of this institution’s responsibility to serve as a beneficial influence on its students, employees, and the community at large; Snead State Community College is designated as a drug and alcohol-free campus and seeks to comply with provisions of Public Law 101-226:

- Snead State prohibits the unlawful or unauthorized manufacture, distribution, dispensation, possession, use, or sale of alcoholic beverages, controlled substances, and illegal drugs on campus. The impairment by alcohol or drugs of any student, employee, or visitor while participating in the academic, workplace, or campus setting is prohibited. SSCC employees, students, and visitors are required to abide by all federal and state laws, local ordinances, and other related state and federal requirements regarding the consumption or possession of alcoholic beverages, controlled substances, and illegal drugs.
- SSCC has contracted with Everfi (through HR) to provide individual additional education to students and employees concerning alcohol and drug education and the prevention of abuse. Student Services and Athletics also provides periodic programming designed to empower wellness of all members of the college community. Programming includes prevention, education, and a review of college policy.

**Student Poss/Use of Alcohol and/or Drugs at Snead State Community College**

Snead State Community College promotes a drug-free campus. Employee’s that violate this policy are subject to the following administrative or criminal actions upon completion of a due process hearing: probation, suspension, termination of employment, prosecution, and/or ban from college property.

**State of Alabama Drug Offenses and Penalties**

A list of Alabama statutes regarding controlled substances, marijuana, and drug paraphernalia is found at the link below. Crimes involving controlled substances range from misdemeanors to felonies, with multiple possibilities of fines and imprisonment. Possession of marijuana for personal use is a Class A misdemeanor for the first offense, but elevated to a felony for a second offense. Possessing drug paraphernalia is a Class C misdemeanor, but elevated to a felony if sold to a person under 18 years of age. The Department of Public Safety may suspend a driver’s license for six months for persons convicted of a drug offense. Likewise, drug offenses may affect student aid, loans, etc. A



drug conviction under state or federal law may result in a student being ineligible for financial aid. <https://studentaid.ed.gov/eligibility/criminal-convictions#drug-convictions>

### **State Alcoholic Beverage Laws and Penalties**

Various Alabama statutes address alcohol-related laws and penalties. Most offenses expose an individual to 30 days to six months in jail and a fine. Penalties for DUI increase with the number of offenses, with the fourth DUI exposing a person to a felony charge. Adults who authorize a party at a residence they control and allow the party to continue with persons under the age of 21 illegally possessing or consuming alcohol without taking reasonable action to prevent it expose themselves to fines and possible jail terms. In addition, civil monetary damages are available through the Alabama Civil Damages Act if injuries are caused by a minor who has consumed alcohol under these conditions.

### **Health Risks Associated with Use of Controlled Substances and Abuse of Alcohol**

Substance abuse and drug dependency are problems of staggering proportions in our society. They are the leading cause of preventable illness, disability, and death in the United States. This number increases dramatically when considering the harm done to families of substance abusers as well as to those injured or killed by intoxicated drivers or in drug-related work accidents. Alcoholism can develop in anyone. It tends to first appear between the ages of 20 to 40, and is more prevalent in persons with a family history of alcoholism.

#### **Alcohol**

Alcoholism is a disorder that has profound psychological, biological, and societal effects. Directly, it affects millions of people. It is normally characterized by three different patterns: regular daily intoxication, drinking large amounts at specific times, or periods of sobriety interspersed with periods of heavy daily drinking. Alcoholism is progressive and physical dependence can develop. If this happens, serious and life-threatening symptoms can develop when alcohol is withdrawn. Short term effects of alcohol use can include depression, gastritis, accidents, disease, and domestic violence. Chronic abuse can produce irreversible health changes including dementia, sexual impotence, cirrhosis, and heart disease. Death may occur as a complication of one of these chronic problems, or secondary to alcohol intoxication.

#### **Marijuana**

Though consequences can vary depending on frequency, duration, and quantity of use; marijuana use has consistently been linked to memory impairment, perception impairment, judgment impairment, and impairment of fine motor skills. The use of this drug increases the risk of machinery or motor vehicle accidents. The active ingredient in marijuana remains stored in fat cells in the body long after ingestion. Marijuana use is associated with anxiety, depression, and feelings of paranoia. Use in children may have long-term developmental consequences.

## **Hallucinogens**

This category of drugs includes not only marijuana, but LSD, mescaline, mushrooms, and peyote. These drugs cause delusions, hallucinations, and impaired perception of time and place. PCP and ecstasy are also included in this category. Psychosis and impaired thinking skills can result after long-term use.

## **Cocaine**

Cocaine is a substance that can be snorted, injected, or smoked. “Speed Balls” are cocaine mixed with heroin, which is a particularly dangerous combination. Physical effects of cocaine use include high blood pressure and heart palpitations. A cocaine “crash” follows the high and includes symptoms of depression, irritability, and paranoia. Serious medical complications may occur with cocaine use to include heart attacks, seizures, and strokes.

## **Amphetamines, Methamphetamine, and Other Stimulants**

In addition to cocaine, a number of other drugs stimulate the nervous system and are very addictive. Most of them belong to the amphetamine family of drugs. Dexedrine (diet pills) when used long-term, and other street drugs such as ecstasy and “ice” are very potent, and the effects may be long-lasting and devastating. The health risks of these and other stimulants are similar to those of cocaine use.

## **Narcotics**

Various medications are taken to relieve pain. Most non-prescription pain relievers (aspirin, Tylenol, motrin, etc) are not considered addictive. However, narcotics (opiates) available via prescription and through illicit means are highly addictive. With close medical supervision, these drugs may be safely used in specific circumstances for a limited time. Tolerance, however, may lead to cravings or needs of a greater amount of the drug to achieve the same result. Eventually, the person could need such a large amount of the drug that it may become poisonous or lethal.

## **Sedatives and Tranquilizers**

Barbiturates and benzodiazepines are two of the most commonly used classes of sedatives. They are highly addictive and can be fatal if taken in excess. Included are drugs such as Valium, Librium, Ativan, Xanax, Dalmane, Halcion, and Restoril. While safe and effective at moderate doses for short periods of time, all have a potential for physical and psychological dependence if used at higher doses for longer periods.

## **Impact of Substance Abuse on Families**

Families are often gravely affected by a substance-abusing member. This can occur on many levels. Infants of alcohol and drug-abusing mothers often have low birth weight, and may suffer from malformations and a variety of developmental problems. Abusers often affect the economic well-being of the family by inability to hold a job, or in some instances by stealing and reducing family stability. Substance abuse takes an emotional toll on the functioning of the individual and the family. Often, the family’s intervention with the user is an essential step in getting the abusing member to seek treatment.

## **Recognizing Signs and Symptoms of Alcohol and Substance Abuse**

Everyone may occasionally have days when they exhibit behavior that's not "like themselves." Unusual behavior in times of high stress can be understood. However, when unusual behavior is displayed on a gradually increasing scale accompanied by a general decline in work habits, it indicates a person may need more intensive/professional help. Below are some of the common signs or symptoms of unusual behavior.

### **Absenteeism and Tardiness**

Arriving late and leaving early, absences before and after holidays, significant use of sick leave, unexplained absences, absences due to accidents both on and off the job.

### **Impaired Job Performance**

Increasing operating errors, lost time, irresponsibility, procrastinating, poor decision making, irregular hours, missing deadlines.

### **Unusual Interpersonal Interactions**

Sudden emotional outbursts, mood swings, overreactions, blaming, making inappropriate statements, rambling or incoherent speech, isolation or increasing social withdrawal.

## (2021 Annual Fire Safety Report)

Elder Hall is the student residential housing facility on the main campus of Snead State Community College in Boaz, Alabama. It consists of two floors above ground, and a basement area. The basement is not utilized as a residential area. Floors 1 and 2 are utilized as student residential areas. There are multiple pull-station type fire alarm activation stations on each floor and at each entrance/exit, as well as stairwells. There are visual flashing fire alert modules located in multiple areas on each floor and are highly visible. Resident rooms and suites are installed with sprinkler heads. There is also an accompanying high-pitched audible tone which can be clearly heard in the event any of the pull stations are activated.

There are multiple fire extinguishers located on each floor in the event of a very small, manageable fire. However, in all cases of a fire alarm activation, local responders via 911 notification will be dispatched to the housing area, located at 404 W Mann Avenue, unless the activation is the result of a planned test; in which the Office of Security will make contact prior with the local fire department. The Elder Hall fire alarm system is a monitored system.

Resident Assistant's and students are trained on the proper evacuation procedures for their respective floor within the main student housing facility in the Summer and Fall. There are five entries/exits located on the primary student housing building located at Elder Hall. There are highly visible exit signs also located throughout the building which highlight exit points. The fire alarm system in the housing area also possesses sprinkler capability. There are fire panels which are accessible only by key to reset and silence the system once the emergency or test is complete.

There have been no fires reported in Elder Hall (primary on-campus dormitory) for this reporting period. The Aviation College at Snead State and the Arab Instructional Site do not offer student housing. There were no fires reported for 2018, 2019, or 2020. The Office of Security conducts fire alarm tests, and also conducts fire drills. The fire panels, system, and extinguishers are all inspected several times during the week on routine rounds, and routinely checked by fire safety contractors. Plans are underway to upgrade some systems across campus which are older than some of the systems in the newer or recently renovated campus buildings.

Additional training has been given to Resident Assistants concerning Fire Safety. Fire safety will continue to be a point of emphasis in the student residential housing areas. Additional fire extinguisher operation training is also given to the Resident Assistants through Boaz Fire Department and SSCC Office of Security. However, at this time, students and staff are advised to clear any building where a fire is present and report by calling 911 and state the location of the fire. Local

fire fighters, police, and security contractors also have immediate access to student housing for emergency purposes by utilizing an issued SSCC emergency scan card, thus ensuring immediate entrance into the main student housing building at any hour.

In the event of a fire, any student or staff member, or visitor should call 911 and report the location of the fire. The area should be completely vacated as soon as possible (all floors). Never use any elevator during a fire emergency. Students and Resident Assistants are trained in the “nearest clear exit” concept of evacuation from the building. In the event of a fire call 911 first! The Office of Security should be notified as soon as possible by calling 256-264-5060 (cell). If necessary, the Office of Security and Boaz Fire Department will work together to clear the building and/or check areas of concern to help ensure student accountability and safety in the event of a fire. In any such scenario, student, staff, and visitor safety will be the priority. The SSCC Office of Security and local Boaz Fire Department have discussed scenarios and response protocols.

**Student Housing Policies Regarding Electrical Appliances, Smoking, and Open Flames**

All appliances within Elder Hall must have an automatic shut-off or timer. Open-coil appliances or open flames of any kind are not allowed in Elder Hall or student houses. Gasoline, kerosene, propane or propane tanks, and/or any other flammable/combustible substance shall not be stored in or around any residence unit or within proximity of the building. Heating units fueled by such materials are not allowed. Candles, oil lamps, incense, or any device producing an open flame is prohibited within student housing. Disciplinary action and/or legal action could result for anyone intentionally starting an open flame in the student housing building. Snead State Community College is a “Tobacco-Free” campus.

## **Fire Safety Regulations**

**It is essential that residents in student housing facilities follow fire safety regulations.**

- No open flames permitted of any kind.
- Do not leave any appliance unattended while in use (curling irons, stoves, heaters)
- NO candles, incense, kerosene lamps, or any incendiary devices are permitted
- The storage or use of flammable liquid is prohibited
- Fireworks are not permitted
- Any appliance with exposed heating elements are prohibited
- The use of multi-outlet plugs is prohibited
- Smoking is prohibited on campus, and also prohibited in all areas of student residential facilities
- In the event of a grease fire or food fire on top of a stove eye, do not attempt to move or lift the container. Instead, turn off the stove eye and cover the pot with a metal lid. If the container is inside the oven, turn the oven off and leave the oven door closed. Notify the appropriate personnel (**911 in event of fire**)
- Portable Space Heaters are not permitted

## **Residence Hall Fire Prevention Information**

The residence hall (Elder Hall) has smoke detectors and sprinkler systems installed and a fire alarm control panel as well as multiple pull stations located throughout the facility. All suites/rooms are equipped with smoke detectors. Each floor is equipped with fire extinguishers. Fire alarm pull stations are located on each corridor of each hall. Tampering with any extinguisher or pull station or fire panel with false pretenses is against the law. Any person who sets off a false alarm, interferes with the operation of the alarm system, damages or removes any part of the alarm system, fire extinguishers, smoke detectors, or exit signs are subject to disciplinary action.

Fire drills will continue to be held each semester. All persons inside the residence hall must evacuate when such a drill is conducted. Failure to evacuate the residence hall for any reason, including sleeping through an alarm, could result in



disciplinary action. The fire alarm in Elder Hall is a monitored alarm system. This concludes the annual fire safety report, which may by policy be included as part of the inclusive Annual Security Report.

### **Policy on Drugs, Alcohol, and Weapons**

The presence, possession, or use of illegal drugs and/or alcohol while on the Snead State Community College, Aviation College, or Arab Instructional Site is prohibited. Possession of any firearm or dangerous weapon or destructive device is prohibited, except those possessed by lawful, duly certified law enforcement authorities in the performance of their official duties. College disciplinary and/or referral to the criminal justice system could result from violating the policy on illegal drugs, alcohol, and weapons. Prohibition of weapons signs are clearly posted on all campus buildings.

### **Severe Weather**

In the event or expectation of severe weather, announcements will be made in all class areas if classes are to be dismissed. College personnel will notify students in the event of a severe weather alert or other emergency situation. Individuals should follow the directions of College personnel in an emergency situation. (Schoolcast alerts may also be utilized in such scenarios and will be initiated by the College Security, IT Department, or by additional trained employees).
